Our students' success in these programs further confirms their college and career readiness beyond their high school degree. These opportunities also prepare our students for not only successful completion of college course work but helps them understand the commitment to degree completion. Furthermore, these opportunities assist our students in overcoming the financial burden that can prohibit entrance to college or hinder degree completion.

Last year, we updated our Math instruction in Grades Pre-K-4, which has resulted in 10% growth in student achievement results. This year, we are continuing our progress and success by expanding the improvements at our Middle School.

This year, we are also focused on duplicating our Pre-K-4 math success in reading. Our Pre-K-4 teachers have committed to increased professional development to learn the cutting-edge research based instructional techniques and strategies.

Furthermore, our wonderful teachers are piloting new and improved instructional reading resources so that the most recent and highest interest instructional resources support our students' learning. We look forward to all of our work in this area significantly increasing student-reading achievement. While this seems to be a comprehensive approach to increasing student learning in reading, we are not stopping there! Furthermore, we ask for your involvement.

As stated in my most recent Tiger Traditions article, our data generally shows that our students who do not participate in Pre-Kindergarten typically under-perform students who attend Pre-Kindergarten. As we enter 2018, we are focused on how to successfully intervene so that all of our students reach their highest potentials and close any achievement gaps as soon as our children enter our schools. We are forming a task force to utilize data to drive instructional decision-making. The committee would be tasked with creating a plan for our District to better support students who enter Kindergarten, but may not be Kindergarten ready. We are confident that such a committee would be able to create a plan that could be implemented for September 2018.
