A Message from the Superintendent



I hope this Tiger Traditions edition finds you enjoying our wonderful summer weather! The 2018-2019 school year was another fantastic year at MACS! We have successes to celebrate and wonderful opportunities to look forward to in the coming school year!

First, I would again like to congratulate our 2019

MACS graduates! They are such a wonderful group of young adults. Some were the first babies born in the 21st century, and I am certain they all will have a profound and positive impact on our world!

I would also like to add that our graduates earned more than \$58,000 in scholarships and awards, including \$16,000 under the Dollars for Scholars umbrella. I thank all our incredibly supportive and generous benefactors and strongly encourage all our students to apply for scholarship money!

As you know, the use of technology in personal and professional arenas is becoming more prevalent with time. This use will continue to grow as our students transition out of our schools and into their post-graduate lives. To ensure that we are preparing our students for their futures, we have provided 1 to 1 technology devices for each student in our District. Our rollout was one of the smoothest any District has experienced. It is another reason why we have the best staff, students and families! I thank everyone for supporting what's best for our students, including our wonderful Board of Education members. I look forward to continuing the refinement of distribution, use and collection of these devices.

We continue to participate in collaborative professional development, which is county wide for the Oswego County Reading Initiative to improve reading achievement for all students. I thank everyone for their continued dedication, commitment and flexibility in participating in this professional development; it is resulting in increased student reading achievement.

I also want to let you know that we keep track of graduation rates for the students attending our high school. (Please note that the State Education Department

measures all our students, including those who are placed in programs outside of our District, which results in different numbers.) Our calculations have shown an increase in the measure of our graduation rate, from 82% in 2015 to 93% this year.

We are working on fixing the lack of rainwater drainage for our baseball and middle school fields. The maintenance drainage work is scheduled to be completed this fall and should result in the use of our fields for the spring of 2020.

You may have noticed that the retaining walls next to the dam at our high school are deteriorating. We are currently working on a plan to resolve the deterioration.

Finally, I wanted to let you know that since the expiration of the most recent FitzPatrick Payment In Lieu of Taxes (PILOT) agreement, we were faced with another tax certiorari lawsuit over Fitzpatrick's full assessed value. In addition to preparing to defend this case, we also participated in trying to reach a fair PILOT agreement.


Please know that while I feel it is fair to all other taxpayers and our students for FitzPatrick to pay taxes on their full assessed value, the uncertainty of litigation outcomes and the extremely high costs of legally defending this type of lawsuit necessitates trying to conclude this issue with the most fair PILOT agreement possible. I am happy to report that after more than a year of negotiations, we have arrived at a 5-year PILOT agreement that is approximately \$2 million more per year than the previous agreement. Equally important, it stabilizes our revenue expectations for the next 5 years.

April Proud to be MACS Honoree

Donna Handley, a teacher at Mexico Elementary School, was selected as the April 2019 Proud to be MACS honoree.

A graduate of Oswego High School, Handley earned her bachelor's degree with a major in education and psychology from SUNY Potsdam before returning to Oswego County for her master's degree from SUNY Oswego with a concentration focusing on the learning

disabled and gifted.

After starting her career with the Oswego City School District as a reading intern, Handley moved to what she would eventually call her "home away from home," at Mexico Elementary teaching third grade in 1987. Throughout her years, she has taught students in the first through fifth grade.

When asked about her favorite part of the job, Donna responded that it was working with the wonderful students and staff of Mexico Elementary. Another great source of pride occurred this year when three of her students were crowned Oswego County Battle of the Books champions. Nominator and fellow teacher Kate LaDuc mentioned that Donna often gave up her lunch time to work with the students to prepare them for this competition.

"She is a terrific teacher who truly cares for her students," LaDuc added. "She is committed to her students and wants them to believe she cares and understands. She goes above and beyond to help boost students' self-esteem and confidence."

Shannon Bigelow, another of Donna's nominators who now teaches at Mexico High School, recalled fondly her time as a member of Handley's third-grade class dozens of years ago.

"I was going through some things that were big to me, and Mrs. Handley was kind, understanding and compassionate," said Bigelow. "She gave me space to grow into myself and spoke encouragement into my life. I still remember that. Our district is better because she has been part of it."

Along the way to becoming such a revered teacher, Handley married Tom, the owner of Burke's Lumber in Oswego and had two children, Zachary and Senna.

Handley was recognized at June's Board of Education meeting as a retiree for her many dedicated years of service to MACS.



May Proud to be MACS Honoree

Linda Daly, a longtime teacher at Mexico Elementary, was honored at a recent Board of Education meeting as the May 2019 Proud to be MACS honoree.

After growing up in the village of Mexico, Daly graduated from Mexico High School in 1982 and decided to continue her education locally by earning her undergraduate and

master's degrees from SUNY Oswego.

Daly was hired in 1986 for a first-grade teaching position at Mexico Elementary. She would teach first grade for seven years. Ironically enough, Linda's daughter Catherine is teaching in the same classroom her mother began teaching in decades ago.

Though Daly started in first grade, the bulk of her career has been spent teaching fourth-graders. Fellow fourth-grade teacher and nominator Kate LaDuc said it was plain to see how much Daly cares about her students.

"She goes above and beyond to show she loves her students," LaDuc said. "She works to make sure all their needs are met and puts in many extra hours for the well-being of her students."

LaDuc added that many former students would return to Daly's classroom after moving to higher grades or graduating to seek advice.

According to Daly, her favorite part of the job is the sense of family that exists at Mexico Elementary. She said she truly believes every single staff member is there for all students.

Daly noted that she views her work not as a job, but a vacation. When asked for her favorite memory, Daly responded that she has too many memories to single out just one.

"Teaching at Mexico has provided me with a lifetime of memories!" she declared.

Mexico joining Harvard center to help study and improve rural education

The Mexico Academy and Central School District recently joined 50 rural schools as a part of the National Center for Rural Education Research Networks (NCRERN), an initiative of the Center for Education Policy Research (CEPR) at Harvard University.

Funded by the Institute of Education
Sciences at the U.S. Department of
Education, the district will have the
opportunity to apply the Proving Ground
model of evidence-based improvement
to address chronic absenteeism, college
readiness and college enrollment.

"We are incredibly proud MACS was chosen as a partner in leading this important work," Mexico Superintendent Sean Bruno said. "Our selection is another recognition of the extraordinary efforts that our students and staff put forth every day as well as the tremendous support from our Board of Education. As part of the National Center for Rural Education Research Networks, we look forward to developing and sharing innovative practices to support increased student successes."

NCRERN will produce tools for identifying students most at risk for absenteeism and being unprepared for college as well as change management resources designed to guide rural schools in addressing chronic absenteeism, college readiness



and college enrollment. Throughout the five years, the center's member districts will collaborate on shared challenges, learning from one another to guide future work on school improvement.

"The network brings together our expertise in strategic management and analytics and our partners' expertise in supporting rural students," said Bi Vuong, Proving Ground director and NCRERN interim director. "We are excited to have the opportunity to collaborate with districts committed to learning with us and sharing their expertise with each other."

Applicants were chosen based on alignment between the district's strategic goals and the work of the center, capacity to utilize data for decision-making, commitment to continuous improvement

practices and geographic distribution.

"The districts selected to be part of the National Center for Rural Education Research Network deserve congratulations," said Capital Region BOCES District Superintendent Anita Murphy. "Their selection represents a uniquely valuable opportunity for them to bring the power of evidence and the Proving Ground improvement model to bear on some of the most pressing issues facing rural districts including chronic absenteeism and college readiness and enrollment. I look forward to learning alongside our districts as they work to improve student outcomes together."

Funding: The Institute of Education Sciences is awarding \$10 million to support the National Center for Rural Education Research Networks; it is being cost shared by IES (91%) and the CEPR at Harvard University and its partners, New York and Ohio (9%).
