

Bench Pays Tribute to Emily Parkhurst

When you walk into the lobby of the Mexico Elementary School, you may notice a bench in the waiting area. Its back consists of baseball bats on both sides,

and the shape of clouds form the top; the craftsmanship of Andrew Butler, husband to first grade teacher Kathy Butler. Its feet are playfully displayed with rubber rain boots and superhero sneakers. The warm colors and subjects you see were painted on by Autumn E. Brown, mother of Emily Alecia Parkhurst.

Emily was born on July 15, 2010. In September of 2015, she became a student of Mexico Elementary, in Lindsey

McCaw's kindergarten class. However, Emily tragically passed away on May 8, 2016, as a result of asphyxiation from a large piece of food. It was shortly before the end of her school year as an accomplished kindergartner.

Although Emily's time in school was brief, it does not lessen the lasting impact she has made as a student and friend. She loved

her teacher and classmates, as well as others who taught and interacted with her. She was respectful and soft-spoken, but loved to be included in fun. Emily was a thoughtful girl, helpful and kind in her actions toward her peers. She was full of perseverance in her learning and had a strong sense of determination to do the very best she could, always.

The bench is a tribute to Emily, to keep a vivid memory of her in that school, and one of the many things done as a celebration of the time we were able to have her in our lives.

Emily's mother, Autumn E. Brown, would like to encourage everyone, of the opportunity is available, to take a First Aid, CPR and/or AED course. She would also like to stress the importance of open understanding, time, patience and most of all love, surrounding a conversation with a child, especially if they inquire about the loss of a loved one or peer.

A Message From the Superintendent



In 2012, the New York State Education Department decided to test public school students in grades 3-8, prior to sharing the new English Language Arts (ELA) and Math Standards with public schools. In addition, the New York State Legislature passed a law that connected student achievement on these exams to the evaluations of principals and teachers. This ill-conceived plan was met with great resistance from parents and public educators and resulted in many parents opting their

student out of the 3-8 NYS English and Math exams. At the time, we were fully supportive of parents who chose to participate in the opt-out movement. The grass roots test boycott movement that followed was effective and sent a clear message to the New York State Education Department.

In fact, the opt-out movement was widespread and very effective. It led to many changes to the NYS 3-8 English Language Arts and Math testing plan including the following:

- The NYS Legislature does not currently allow principal and teacher evaluations to be tied to the NYS 3-8 Testing Program. It is believed by many that they will permanently decouple student test scores from principal and teacher evaluations.
- The first testing company that created the NYS Grades 3-8 English and Math Exams was Pearson. This company has been replaced by Questar, who believes in directly involving teachers in the process of creating fair and reasonable exams.
- The tests are shorter and limited to two days instead of the original three days of testing and there are fewer questions.
- Students with learning disabilities making it difficult to read are now allowed to have tests read to them when taking both the NYS 3-8 English Language Arts and Math exams.
- Originally if a student scored a 1 or 2 on the NYS ELA or Math exam the student was assigned to Academic Intervention Services (AIS). This is no longer true. Now schools use multiple measures including teacher input to determine whether AIS is needed.
- Most test questions are now released and shared with schools so teachers can see what questions were missed by a majority of their students and adapt their instruction accordingly.
- Teachers, students and parents can access questions missed by individual

students in order to know what areas they need to work on to improve as a student.

Teachers are creating and reviewing more test questions to avoid trick questions and ensure the tests reflect the key skills and knowledge students must acquire at every grade level.

All of these changes have made the testing process more reasonable and fairer for students. Over the past seven years, we have provided trainings for teachers to update their instructional practices which provide our students with the skills and knowledge they need to be successful in college, a career or military service. It is important that teachers, parents and students have the opportunity to use state tests as a teaching tool designed to improve teaching and learning. When a student opts out of a 3-8 English or Math exam the teacher and parent do not receive a report describing the academic strengths and weaknesses of that student. It is a missed opportunity that could benefit every MACS student.

In addition to these changes, our Federal Government has passed the "Every Student Succeeds Act," which requires 95% of our students to participate in taking the English and Math New York State Exams.

If 95% of our students do not participate in taking the assessments, the Federal Government will require our District to develop specific plans of instruction to increase student participation on State tests. It will also require us to utilize some of our annual federal aid in accordance with the Federal Government's improvement plan as opposed to spending it on what we feel is most beneficial for our students. If our District fails to meet the expectations of the State and Federal Government, we could be designated for receivership. This is when the New York State Education Department comes in and takes over our schools at the cost of losing local control.

Let's band together and begin using state tests as a teaching and learning tool that allows us to use the data to improve instruction and learning. This benefits our students, teachers, principals and parents by providing them with the data to target the skills and knowledge they need to improve upon to be successful after graduation. William Truax, New Haven's school monitor, has been chosen as the December 2018 Proud to be MACS recipient.

Truax grew up in the Village of Mexico, graduating from MACS in 1988. Bill would receive his Bachelor of Arts degree with a

major in political science from SUNY Oswego in 1993. Though his degree may not have prepared him for a specific job, it did, in his opinion, prepare him for whatever job and life challenges that would come his way.

Truax joined the MACS district in 1998 as a school monitor at Mexico High School at the suggestion of former high school English teacher and principal, Gary Smith. He would remain there until 2010 when he would move to New Haven Elementary as a school monitor for principals Cathy Caros and later Dan Packard.

"Bill is a tremendously dedicated employee at New Haven Elementary. His title is technically Recess Monitor, but Bill goes above and beyond the duties associated with this job," said teacher Alexandra Scorzelli, who nominated Truax for the Proud to be MACS honor.

"Another example of Bill's kindness was shown one day when a teacher was doing a project with her students that required brown paper bags. When she realized she was short two bags, she asked Bill if he knew were she might find some in the school. He immediately ran to his car and gave her two of his personal, reusable paper grocery bags. As you can see, Bill has a selfless heart!"

Truax said his favorite part of the job is working with the dedicated staff and, of course, the students. When asked what his favorite memories of work are, he said seeing the growth and development that occurs in the students from pre-K to fourth grade.

English teacher Anne Michaelis, a coadvisor of Mexico's Creative Writing Club, applauded the hard work and skill Thompson showed.

"I knew from the moment she entered this club that she was an outstanding writer who doesn't give herself enough credit," said Michaelis. "I'm so proud of her."

In total, 15 students are participating in the Lighthouse Team this year. While the team usually consists of third and fourthgraders only, the team was




opened up to second-grade students this year.

New Sensory Path at Palermo Helping Students Succeed

Looking to help students refocus and increase cognitive functioning, students at Palermo Elementary now have access to a sensory path.

The path, which is featured in a hallway in the heart of the building, is designed with a series of movements to help students refocus and work toward higher academic abilities.

According to educators Sarah Herrington and Erica Schipper, the path includes zig-zags, starts and stops, hopping and other movement patterns designed to help sensory abilities.

Many, if not all, Palermo students have utilized the path and have felt the benefits of following it. The path, which took about a month to create, takes students approximately one-and-a-half minutes to complete.

Another unique part of the path is that staff members have decided against instructing students on how to use the path, and instead allow the students to use their imaginations, thus allowing students to be their own leaders.
