MACS Rolls Out New 1:1 Laptop Program

After years of preparation, including training 75 percent of its teachers in blended learning, Mexico Academy & Central School District recently began the roll out of its 1:1 Laptop Program.

The district recently distributed laptops to students in grades two through 12 as part of the program, which is designed to combine the traditional classroom setting with more digital assignments.

According to Superintendent Sean Bruno, the district's commitment to the program is sparked by the changing digital climate, both nationally and globally.

"In order for us to achieve our mission to educate and motivate students to be respectful citizens, we must continually monitor and adjust to our national and global landscapes," said Bruno. "We must provide opportunities and resources in our classrooms so that our students may utilize digital tools to effectively communicate, collaborate, to think critically and to be creative problem solvers."

Students in grades two through four have a device assigned to them in their classroom and they may utilize it for any necessary classroom switching. Fifth- through 12th-graders, however, are permitted to bring the laptops home for flexible studying, research time and completion of class assignments.

Students in grades pre-kindergarten through first-grade will have a classroom set of iPads for age-appropriate digital literacy development.

The program works in conjunction with the district's commitment to blended learning, which Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum & Instruction Mary Beth Horn said will allow students to actively determine aspects of their learning, such as the pace in which they learn.

"The combination of hands-on and engaged learning will increase technical skills and support student interaction, creativity and critical thinking skills," said Horn.

MACS Director of Technology Steve Roux said one concern parents may have with the program may be related to students having too much screen time with the laptops. Roux said he believes the district has addressed this concern via its blended learning practices.

"Blended learning is not about the technology. It's about the students working collaboratively with their peers, taking ownership of their learning and using technology tools to support their learning," said Roux. "We feel this approach will engage students, provide digital literacy skills and better prepare students for their future."

Roux said after years of training and supporting teachers and integrating technology in the classrooms, the district is excited to finally distribute the laptops to students.






MACS Excited to Participate in Oswego County Literacy Initiative

Leaders and educators at Mexico Academy & Central School District are thrilled to be a part of the new Oswego County Literacy Initiative (OCLI), a collboration between school districts, the CNYOC Teacher Center, CiTi BOCES and the highly acclaimed Reading League.

The initiative is the result of discussions between area superintendents, district administrators and BOCES



leadership on how to best address the ever changing needs of Oswego County students, especially in the area of literacy.

The result of these discussions led to a partnership with the Reading League, whose mission is to build educator knowledge of how to teach reading using evidence-based, highly effective methods of reading instruction and assessment.

"Mexico's elementary teachers are fortunate to have worked closely with Maria Murray and Kris Munger from SUNY Oswego last year. What we realize now is that reading instruction should be deeply rooted in brain research and not on the pedagogical beliefs of individuals, which may vary from person to person," said MACS Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction Mary Beth Horn.

Horn said the district's work with the OCLI will focus on what early reading instruction should encompass, including explicit and systematic phonics instruction until a child knows how to master the alphabetic code.

"This is fundamental to the equally complex skills needed to derive meaning from the written word," said Horn.

As part of the OCLI, regular, job-embedded coaching by Reading League trained coaches will support teachers as they seek to implement reading strategies in their classrooms throughout the school year.

Data collection will also be an integral component of the initiative. Tools such as teacher surveys, pre-post questionnaires, administrator and teacher interviews, assessment data, attendance/behavior data will be used to measure changes in teacher practice, attitudes and beliefs about effective reading instruction and the learning outcomes of the students.

Work through this initiative started over the summer when elementary principals and district representatives gathered for a two-day administrator overview and introduction to OCLI. In addition, nearly 40 professionals from all nine districts, CiTi BOCES and Reading League coaches attended a six-day LETRS (Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling) training sponsored by the CNYOC Teacher Center. Lastly, approximately 180 Oswego County teachers, administrators, superintendents and Reading League coaches were present for a full-day introductory event held at the Pulaski Junior-Senior High School in July.

All county-wide PreK-3, special education, and intervention teachers of reading will begin working collaboratively on this initiative on the upcoming November 9th Superintendent's Conference Day.

Little Salmon River to assess
water quality, catch and study
invertebrates and determine how
the river's resources can have an
impact on Lake Ontario.

The visit is one of four different locations the science department

will embark on this school year, which will also feature trips to Mexico Point State Park, Selkirk Park and Black Creek behind Mexico High School. According to teacher Alicia Archer, the field trips allow students to step out of the classroom and right into hands-on learning.

"The students really enjoy this and get a lot out of it," said Archer. "It's good to get the students outdoors and into the water."

Throughout the year, students will test water chemistry, including pH, nitrate and phosphate levels, participate in a beach cleanup and learn about the dangers plastic plays on the environment.

"We're just very thankful for these opportunities," said Archer. "We thank the district for supporting these trips."

Archer also thanked the owners of Yogi's Jellystone Park for granting the students access to the river and for their continued support of the science department's endeavors.

After climbing the highest mountain in Africa despite being blind, Fulton native Tim Conners recently visited with students at Mexico Elementary School to discuss the importance of perseverance and hard work.

Principal Bob Briggs introduced Conners as a special man who displays the leadership qualities the school looks for in its students.

Conners then discussed the obstacles he's had to overcome during his life, including being diagnosed with cancer and losing

his vision. Now a college graduate and motivational speaker, Conners detailed how he didn't let those setbacks stop him from following his dreams, which included climbing Mt. Kilimanjaro, which sits more than 19,000 feet above sea level.

"Climbing a mountain is just like working in the classroom. If you don't get up every day and work hard, you might not make it to that big moment," said Conners.

Conners said by working hard, being kind to others and never giving up, he knows students can reach their dreams as well.

"You can all go on to great things," said Conners. "You can all live your impossible."
