

## A Message from the Superintendent



I hope our 2017-2018 school budget edition finds you as excited about our current school year as well as our future as I am!

Before writing this article, I was reflecting on our financial outlook last year at this time. While we were able to create a 2016-2017 school year budget that continued our great tradition of providing incredible opportunities for students, staff, and our community,

our financial outlook was less than desirable. This time last year, we were facing the loss of over \$10.8 million in school district revenue due to Entergy's intention to close FitzPatrick.

Due to everyone's hard work, dedication, and collaboration, we were able to achieve what was thought to be impossible — we saved FitzPatrick! I want to thank everyone, including our partners in the town of Scriba, the county of Oswego, the Upstate Energy Jobs Coalition, Assemblyman Barclay, Senator Ritchie, Governor Cuomo, and everyone that worked hard in supporting this huge success! I especially want to thank our current and former Mexico Board of Education members for their vision, stewardship, and support in ensuring that through all of our challenges, we are well positioned to provide the best for students, staff, and community!

While we may not be seeing the revenue we once enjoyed, I am happy to report to you that we are able to create a proposed 2017-2018 school year budget, which continues to increase opportunities for our students, staff, and community with no increase to the tax levy for the second year in a row. That's right, no increase to the tax levy again this year!

Our due diligence in ensuring fiscal efficiency with every single penny of taxpayer money that we receive has resulted in the following proposed 2017-2018 budget highlights:

- Increases student programming
  - Increased number of college courses and degree programs
  - Support teacher & student needs as outlined in strategic plans
  - Continue updating math 5-8
  - Continue increases embedded instructional technology
- Increases staffing to maintain low class size
  - Palermo & New Haven
- Continues to make improvements to all of our 5 schools
- Continues to make improvements to our transportation facility
- NO INCREASE TO TAX LEVY FOR 2nd YEAR IN A ROW

I am happy to inform you that in addition to these highlights, our proposed 2017-2018 school year budget aligns resources to achieve our goals, honors our rich history and traditions, and protects our identity. The proposed 2017-2018 school year budget also continues to provide many of the wonderful opportunities for our students such as:

- **Leader in Me:** teaches 21st century leadership and life skills to students and creates a culture of student empowerment based on the idea that every child can be a leader.
- **Blended Learning:** delivery of content and instruction via digital and online media with some element of student control over time, place, path, or pace.
- Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID): closes the achievement gap by preparing all students for college readiness and success in a global society.

- Advanced Placement: a program created by the College Board, which offers college-level curricula and examinations to high school students.
- Project Lead the Way: provides transformative learning experiences through
  pathways in computer science, engineering, and biomedical science. Students
  learn problem-solving strategies, critical thinking skills, creative thinking skills,
  and they learn how to communicate and collaborate.
- **Community Programs:** All community programs will continue for the 2017–2018 school year.

#### Onondaga Community College Credit Now Partnership Program

- All Mexico High School students eligible to earn an Associate's Degree in Humanities and Social Sciences, all within their four years of high school for free!
- All Mexico High School students eligible to earn a minimum of 12 college credits.
- All credits guaranteed transferable throughout the SUNY and CUNY system as well as additional agreements with private colleges.

#### Oswego County P-Tech High School

- Re-invents high school as a unique partnership between local industry, higher education and public high school.
- A 5 to 6-year program resulting in a Regents diploma AND an Associate's degree in Electrical Engineering Technology or Mechanical Technology through Onondaga Community College.

#### Summer Instruction

• For K- 8 students not meeting grade level benchmarks in reading, writing, and math.

#### **March Proud to be MACS Honoree**

Cindy Kotwas, MACS Bus Driver, was chosen as the March 2017 Proud to be MACS honoree. Cindy grew up in Mexico and attended the Mexico Schools. She began her career with the MACS Transportation Department in 1991 as a school bus monitor. She moved up to driving the MACS station wagon, then to a small bus. By the mid-1990's Cindy was driving the full-sized school bus. Cindy has driven a Palermo route in the past and is currently driving Mexico and New Haven routes. Her

day begins at the bus garage at 6:30am and ends at 4pm. Throughout the day she transports students of all grade levels – from pre-K to high school. All total, Cindy has worked in the MACS Transportation Department for 26 years.

How does she feel about her job? "I absolutely love this job and I love our district."

Asked what her favorite part of her job is, she is quick to answer, "The kids. I enjoy the differences of each child. I enjoy just making the kid's day: changing the radio station for them, listening, showing them that I care - going that extra mile so they know."

Cindy went more than the extra mile in the fall of 2007, while she was transporting a seven year old student from Palermo. The young child, named Eric, was in foster care and having recently experienced his sister's move to a different home, got on the bus one day and asked several questions. His final question was, "I was just wondering Bus Driver, if you would adopt me." Within hours Cindy answered yes, and the adoption process was soon in motion.

Considering the Proud to be MACS Award, Cindy says, "I'm just in awe. I cannot believe it. I'm excited." Cindy makes her home in New Haven with her husband, Dave, and her two children: Dannielle, who is grown and also works for MACS Transportation as a bus monitor, and Eric, who is a junior at Mexico High School.



#### **April Proud to be MACS Honoree**

Adam Metcalf, Mexico Middle School 7th Grade History Teacher, was chosen as the Proud to be MACS honoree for April 2017. Adam grew up in Oswego and was a member of the last graduating class of Bishop Cunningham High School in 1992. Considering the Proud to be MACS award, Adam says, "It's a great honor. It makes me reflect on all the people that have helped me out through the years. And it also makes me appreciate how good I've got it."

Adam lives in Oswego in the house that has been in his family for nearly 80 years. He is married to Helene, a speech pathologist, and they are parents of four children: Sam is 15 years old, Sean is 12, Josie is 9, and Wilson is 7.

# BUDGET VOTE and SCHOOL BOARD ELECTIONS

**Tuesday, May 16 • Noon - 9 pm**Mexico, New Haven, and Palermo Elementary Schools

Voters are asked to decide upon two (2) propositions, including the adoption of the proposed budget for the school year commencing July 1, 2017 and ending June 30, 2018, and to elect three Board of Education members.

#### **Budget**

Shall the Board of Education of the Mexico Academy and Central School District, Mexico, New York, be authorized to expend the sums of money, which will be required for school district purposes for the 2017-18 School Year, in the total amount of \$53,748,377 (The Budget), and to levy the necessary sum against the taxable real property in the School District.

#### **PROPOSITION I**

Shall the Board of Education purchase and finance four (4) 66- passenger school buses, four (4) small vehicles for student transportation, and two (2) maintenance vehicles at an estimated cost not to exceed \$683,637 including necessary furnishings, fixtures and equipment and all other costs incidental thereto and to expend a total sum not to exceed \$683,637, which is estimated to be the total maximum cost thereof, and levy a tax for the foregoing in the amount of \$683,637, which shall be levied and collected in annual installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education and in anticipation of the collection of such tax, bonds and notes of the District are hereby authorized to be issued at one time or from time to time in the principal amount not to exceed \$683,637 and a tax is hereby voted to pay the interest on said obligations when due..

## A Message from the Board President

#### What a difference a year makes!

Last year, at this time, the MACS District was still dealing with the unclear status of its largest taxpayer, The Fitzpatrick Nuclear Power Plant.

Through the efforts of many, this potential economic calamity for the District has stabilized. Though details still remain to be negotiated, the continued operation of that facility seems assured and that is great news for our District.

Also, during the summer of 2016, a committee met several times to establish a Strategic Plan for our District that included a Vision, Mission, Core Values, and Measurements. All involved in this process came away energized and excited.

All of this has made for a noteworthy 2016-2017 school year. But, the work continues. Consequently, at our April 13, 2017 monthly business meeting, the MACS Board of Education adopted a \$53,748,377 budget for the 2017-2018 school year.

This budget is the result of months of efforts by Superintendent Sean Bruno, his staff, and the budget committee. It includes several key highlights.

First, student programming is not only maintained but enhanced. Established programs like The Leader in Me, which teaches Stephen Covey's 7 Habits of Highly Effective People to our elementary students; Blended Learning, a more intense use of technology by classroom teachers and students; AVID, a college preparation class for students; Advanced Placement classes for those students wanting the extra challenge; and Project Lead the Way, a program utilizing the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematic) curriculum will continue.

In addition we will continue to offer the P-Tech High school program, which partners with local industry, higher education and public high school education that can result in a Regents diploma and an Associate's degree in Electrical Engineering Technology or Mechanical Technology through Onondaga Community College.

Also, the District has created a partnership with Onondaga Community College that could result in our students earning an Associate's Degree in Humanities and Social Sciences for free!

Our students will also be eligible to earn college credits that will be transferrable to any of the State University of New York or City of New York colleges.

Second, the staff is maintained. In fact, additions may be necessary to meet our student needs particularly at two of our elementary schools - New Haven and Palermo.

Finally, facility enhancements will continue. In particular, our transportation center needs some updating and this budget will ensure that those updates are made.

The budget accomplishes all of the above and much more but the best news is that these accomplishments are made with no increase to the tax levy!

Realizing the economics of our area, the Superintendent and the Board made it a priority to not burden the taxpayers. We think that this budget accomplishes that priority.

However, with every budget there may be questions or concerns, so I extend an invitation for you to join us for the annual budget presentation and meet the candidates on Tuesday, May 9th, 2017 beginning at 6:00 pm in the Mexico Middle School Auditorium.

Should anyone have questions or concerns regarding this budget prior to or following the budget presentation, please feel free to contact the MACS District Office or any MACS Board of Education member and we will try our best to address your questions or concerns.

Finally, I urge all of you to exercise your right to vote on Tuesday, May 16, 2017 from noon until 9:00 pm at the Mexico, New Haven, and Palermo Elementary Schools.

Thank you for your consideration and I hope to see you for the budget presentation on May 9th.


#### The Three-Component Budget

The State legislation which requires the state's school districts to have a public budget vote, includes the requirement that the budget be divided up into three components: program, capital, and administration. (see chart on next page)

**Program Budget:** This portion covers teacher salaries, school supplies, and all related educational costs.

**Capital Budget:** Refers to all facilities costs such as leases, annual debt service, custodial salaries and benefits, service contracts, custodial supplies, maintenance and repair of facilities, and utilities.

Administrative Budget: This section includes central administration and school offices, along with clerical support, salaries and benefits, and related expenses of all school administrators, board of education expenses for planning, and other administrative activities.

The following items are excluded from a contingent budget: equipment purchases, student supplies, non-essential maintenance, transportation of students under mileage limits set by state law, and public use of school building and grounds, except where there is no cost to the District. In light of the Property Tax Cap, under contingency the school district can levy no more taxes than the amount of taxes levied in the prior school year by the district.

## **Basic STAR Exemption Impact**

Three factors that determine the tax rate on your home include: tax levy, equalization rates and property assessment. The tax levy is set by the school district in May; equalization rates are established by the New York State Office of Real Property Services in August and each respective town establishes assessments and equalization rates, but these are just estimates. Therefore, tax rates are not finalized until late August, at which time school tax bills are printed and mailed.

Estimated Basic STAR Tax Savings <sup>1</sup>	\$573.00

The Basic STAR exemption is available for owner-occupied, primary residences regardless of the owners' ages or incomes. Basic STAR works by exempting the first \$30,000 of the full value of a home from school taxes.

 $^1\mbox{The basic school tax}$  relief (STAR) exemption is authorized by section 425 of the Real Property Tax Law.

\*Beginning with 2011-12 school levies, increases in STAR savings are capped at 2% of the prior year savings. The cap is not on the exemption amount – but on the savings amount.

#### **How to Register to Vote**

A qualified voter of the District shall vote only at the polling place for the election district in which such voter resides and no person shall be entitled to vote at such election whose name does not appear on the Register of the School District. Registration of otherwise unregistered voters shall take place at the District Office, 16 Fravor Rd. Suite A, Mexico, New York, between the hours of 10:00 A.M. and 2:00 P.M. on any day when school is in session up to but not later than 2:00 P.M. on May 11, 2017. Any resident whose name currently appears on said register or on the register of the Oswego County Board of Elections for permanent personal registration or who has voted in any annual or special election within the four calendar years preceding 2017 need not register.

#### **Absentee Ballots**

Absentee ballots are available at the office of the District Clerk at the District Office, 16 Fravor Road, Mexico on school days from 9 am -3 pm. All ballots must be returned to the District Clerk by 5 pm on May 16, the date of the budget vote.

#### **Voter Qualifications**

- 1. Eighteen (18) years of age or older.
- 2. A citizen of the United States.
- **3.** A <u>legal</u> resident of the Mexico Academy and Central School District for at least thirty (30) days prior to the vote.

Voters may be required to show proof of eligibility before casting their vote. The following forms of proof may be accepted (not limited to): birth certificate, driver's license, non-driver ID card, utility bill, voter registration card or passport.

Any person not qualified to register or vote under the provisions of Sections 5-100 and 5-106 of the Election Law shall not have the right to register for or vote in an election.



## CNC Mill Work Happening at Mexico High School

For the first time ever students in the Computer Integrated Manufacturing Class at Mexico High School are experiencing the use of a Computer Numeric Control Mill (CNC Mill). Under the tutelage of MACS Technology Education Teacher Dave von Holtz, 10th - 12th grade students created container designs using 3D AutoDesk Inventor modeling software. The class then voted on the favorite container design (created by Emma Teeter), and moved on to make the containers using the CNC Mill. A block of RenShape (similar to composite decking), was placed in the mill, the protective Plexiglas window was closed, and five milling processes took place to create the top and bottom pieces of the precisely designed container. The process was repeated again and again.

# Ryan's Story Presentation at Mexico High and Middle Schools



John Halligan, of Essex Junction, Vermont, gave five Ryan's Story presentations in the Mexico School District on April 11-12, 2017. John Halligan and his wife Kelly lost their son, Ryan, to suicide in 2003, when he was 13 years old. During the five presentations in the MACS District (an evening one for parents, two for middle school students, and two for high school students), Halligan

shared the story of his son Ryan's life and the lessons he, as a dad, learned about cyber-bullying, depression, and suicide. He also reviewed the work he did toward the passage of the Vermont Bully Prevention Law and the law pertaining to mandatory suicide prevention education in public schools. Halligan explained bullying, cyber-bullying, the dangers of social media, depression, and suicide. For parents, he encouraged checking in with their children on a mental health level, and he offered suggestions for youth internet use including, but not limited to: asking the child to show what they are doing online, not allowing secret passwords, discussing bullying, employing monitoring and filtering software, restricting apps, setting time limits, and considering both age and maturity levels. He also encouraged the use of flip-phones for preteens vs smart phones. One main message Halligan has for students in regard to bullying is, 'Don't be a bystander, be an upstander...'
